Educate

- Donate or get involved with an <u>Indigenous People's</u> or <u>Native American</u> organization and their unique causes.
- Volunteer with an <u>organization</u> that serves the Native American population, including adopting an elder within the Navajo community.
- Be an Ally Learn about <u>cultural appropriation vs</u> <u>cultural appreciation</u> of the Native American culture, and what you can do to be an ally.
